ABOUT THE ARTISTS

LIME CORDIALE

Lime Cordiale is one of Australia's most vibrant and genre-blending pop-rock bands, formed in 2009 on Sydney's Northern Beaches by brothers **Oliver (Oli)** and **Louis Leimbach**. Raised in a creative household, the brothers grew up surrounded by art, film, and music, influences that would later shape their eclectic style and free-spirited approach.

The band's debut album, *Permanent Vacation* (2017), marked their arrival on the national stage, offering a quirky mix of indie-pop and surf-rock. While well-received, it was their sophomore record, *14 Steps to a Better You* (2020), that catapulted them to mainstream success. The album debuted at #1 on the ARIA Albums Chart, won Australian Album of the Year at the J Awards, and earned them the Breakthrough Artist – Release award at the ARIA Music Awards. Songs like 'Robbery' and 'On Our Own' became festival anthems, with 'Robbery' landing at #7 in the Triple J Hottest 100.

In 2021, Lime Cordiale took an unexpected creative leap, teaming up with actor-musician Idris Elba for the collaborative EP *Cordi Elba*. Blending their pop sensibilities with Elba's rap and spoken-word delivery, the project produced tracks like 'Apple Crumble' and 'What's Not To Like', debuting at #9 on the ARIA charts and further cementing their reputation for boundary-pushing creativity.

Their third album, Enough of the Sweet Talk (2024), continued their streak of success, debuting at #1 and exploring the arc of a romantic relationship—from attraction and bliss to insecurity and heartbreak. Singles such as 'Facts of Life', 'Country Club', and 'Cold Treatment' showcased a refined songwriting style while maintaining their playful edge. The record earned a nomination for Best Cover Art at the ARIAs and was longlisted for Best LP/EP at the 2025 Rolling Stone Australia Awards.

Beyond music, Lime Cordiale has emerged as leaders in sustainability within the music industry. Partnering with Suitcase Records, they released *Enough of the Sweet Talk* on bio-vinyl, a material that cuts carbon emissions by 92%. They've toured using electric vehicles, offset their travel footprint and even launched a carbonneutral beer—blurring the line between art and activism.

Their live performances are equally celebrated, marked by vibrant stagecraft, infectious energy, and a genuine connection with fans. International tours have seen them sell out shows across Europe and North America, while in Australia they remain festival favourites and consistent Triple J Hottest 100 contenders.

From their coastal beginnings to topping national charts, Lime Cordiale has built a career on curiosity, charisma, and a refusal to fit neatly into one genre. In doing so, they've become not just one of Australia's most successful bands, but also one of its most forward-thinking.



ABOUT THE ARTISTS

ALEX TURLEY arranger

Alex Turley (b. 1995) is a composer based in Australia. His music has been described as 'a focused expression of musical ideas ranging from pulsating energy to contemplative stasis' (*Limelight*) and has been premiered in venues such as the Sydney Opera House, the Myer Music Bowl and the Kennedy Center.

Highly sought-after as a collaborative artist, Alex has worked with all of Australia's major orchestras and a diverse group of artists including Ali McGregor, Banks, Ben Folds, Dan Sultan, Electric Fields, Emma Donovan, Eskimo Joe, Genesis Owusu, G Flip, the Hoodoo Gurus, Katie Noonan, Lime Cordiale, Ngaiire, Paul Grabowsky, Parkway Drive, Rob Thomas, Ruel and Rüfüs Du Sol.

Alex was the Melbourne Symphony Orchestra's 2022 Young Composer-in-Residence, a position through which he was commissioned to create three new orchestral works. Between 2023 and 2025 he was awarded a highly competitive Creative and Performance Leadership Fellowship from the Forrest Research Foundation with a research project focused on environment-driven collaborative composition. In 2024 he was the UNSW Layton Emerging Composer Fellow.

Significant recent works include the ocean's dream of itself, a song cycle for mezzo-soprano and orchestra premiered by Sasha Cooke at the Grand Teton Music Festival, Mirage, a piece for brass ensemble designed to be spread out across the Sydney Opera House Concert Hall and commissioned by the Sydney Symphony Orchestra; and Agam, a fifty-minute long suite of three orchestral pieces developed in collaboration with South Asian artist collective Sangam for performance at the Sidney Myer Music Bowl.

In September 2025 Alex's Sonata for Violin and Piano was released on all streaming platforms via ABC Classic.

Alex's orchestral work *City of Ghosts*, written for the Melbourne Symphony Orchestra when the composer was nineteen, was described as 'an accessible, brilliant piece of music' (*Atlanta Journal-Constitution*) and possessing a 'refined sense of texture and atmosphere' (*Partial Durations*), while the more recent chamber work *Zero Sum Game* was lauded as an 'exciting aural landscape... alternatively driving and luxuriating, the young composer taking the compositional turns with ease' (*Limelight*).

Regularly working outside genre boundaries, Alex frequently works on projects which bring fresh ideas into traditional spaces. In 2022 his show with Electric Fields and the Melbourne Symphony Orchestra was described as an 'effervescent, electronic neo-soul song cycle...sonically painted live by the limitless textures of the most profound musical organism' (*Beat*).

Alex completed a Master of Music (Composition) at the Sydney Conservatorium with a research project investigating diverse approaches to musical temporality. This followed undergraduate studies in composition at the Western Australian Academy of Performing Arts with a First Class Honours Thesis investigating the work of Toru Takemitsu.

ABOUT THE ARTISTS

VANESSA SCAMMELL conductor

Vanessa Scammell's most recent engagements include 5 performances of Harry Potter and the Prisoner of Azkaban with the Sydney Symphony, a double bill (The Dream/Marguerite and Armand) for The Australian Ballet, Harry Potter and the Deathly Hallows Part 1 for the Melbourne Symphony and Megan Washington with the Tasmanian, Adelaide, Melbourne and Sydney Symphony Orchestras. In 2021/2022, she conducted the Sydney, Melbourne, Queensland and West Australian Symphony Orchestras in programmes such as Vera Blue, The Bamboos, Birds of Tokyo, An Evening with Anthony Warlow, Love Actually, To Barbra With Love and Opera in the Outback (for Opera Queensland). In 2025, she conducts the Macao Orchestra and all six major Australian symphony orchestras.

She enjoys a diverse portfolio of work as a conductor of ballet, musical theatre, concert repertoire and opera.

Vanessa's postgraduate study included a Masters in Conducting; she has been the recipient of the Brian Stacey Award and the Robert and Elizabeth Albert Conducting Fellowship for The Australian Ballet.

Vanessa has regularly conducted the Sydney, Queensland, Melbourne, Christchurch, West Australian and Adelaide Symphony Orchestras. Her concert credits include: From Broadway to La Scala; Peter and Jack starring Barry Humphries, Idina Menzel LIVE – Barefoot at the Symphony; Eskimo Joe and Lea Salonga in Concert. She has also conducted staged concert versions of Sweeney Todd and Jekyll & Hyde (both starring Anthony Warlow).

She was Musical Director for *The Divorce* (an opera commissioned for television by Opera Australia, Princess Pictures and the ABC) and was the Helpmann Award's Music Director for 13 years.

In 2018, Vanessa conducted *The Merry Widow* for Opera Australia, West Australian Opera and Opera Queensland. She also led a symphonic tour of *Planet Earth* for the BBC; in 2019, she conducted the national tour of *Blue Planet 2* for the same organisation.

THE ORCHESTRA

PATRON Her Excellency The Honourable Margaret Beazley AC KC

Founded in 1932 by the Australian Broadcasting Commission, the Sydney Symphony Orchestra has evolved into one of the world's finest orchestras as Sydney has become one of the world's great cities. Resident at the iconic Sydney Opera House, the Sydney Symphony Orchestra also performs in venues throughout Sydney and regional New South Wales, and international tours to Europe, Asia and the USA have earned the Orchestra worldwide recognition for artistic excellence.

The Orchestra's first chief conductor was Sir Eugene Goossens, appointed in 1947; he was followed by Nicolai Malko, Dean Dixon, Moshe Atzmon, Willem van Otterloo, Louis Fremaux, Sir Charles Mackerras, Zdenek Macal, Stuart Challender, Edo de Waart and Gianluigi Gelmetti. Vladimir Ashkenazy was Principal Conductor from 2009 to 2013, followed by David Robertson as Chief Conductor from 2014 to 2019. Australian-born Simone Young commenced her role as Chief Conductor in 2022, a year in which the Orchestra made its return to a renewed Sydney Opera House Concert Hall.

The Sydney Symphony Orchestra's concerts encompass masterpieces from the classical repertoire, music by some of the finest living composers, and collaborations with guest artists from all genres, reflecting the Orchestra's versatility and diverse appeal. Its award-winning education program is central to its commitment to the future of live symphonic music, and the Orchestra promotes the work of Australian composers through performances, recordings and its commissioning program.
