## **ABOUT THE MUSIC**

Witold Lutosławski is perhaps the most significant Polish composer since Chopin. He was greatly influenced by Polish folk music – including these Dance Preludes from 1955, which he described as a 'farewell to folklore'. Although based on folksongs from Northern Poland, the folk elements mingle indecipherably with the composer's customary skill, resulting in five little movements of considerable charm.

Henry Purcell was one of the great English composers of the Baroque era, whose influence has extended into the 21st century thanks to composers like Benjamin Britten; his Young Person's Guide to the Orchestra is built on a Purcell theme. Purcell's deep understanding of the trumpet is evident in the first movement's fanfare-like theme and the delicacy and suppleness of the third.

Czech composer **Jiří Jaroch** drew on his broad arts industry experience when writing his works, from playing viola at the Smetana Theatre in Prague to working as a dramaturgist and music director at Czechoslovakian Radio. His *Children's Suite* was written as a present for children of the members of the Czech Nonet. Serene, playful and poetic, its style and structure has charmed children of all ages.

Felix Mendelssohn wrote his Second String Quartet when he was just 18, but he was already an experienced composer of chamber music. He was fascinated by Beethoven's late quartets, but unlike the introspective, existential quality of those works, Mendelssohn's is passionate and richly romantic.

Another Czech composer, **Bohuslav Martinů** began his career steeped in Romantic music: he was a violinist in the Czech Philharmonic and briefly studied under Josef Suk (Dvořák's son-in-law). But after moving to Paris in 1923, Martinů was drawn more to neoclassicism and its emphasis on clarity, economy and emotional restraint. His Nonet No.2 features nine unique instruments conversing with each other as if nine guests at an elegant dinner party.

French composer **Jacques Castérède** entered the Paris Conservatory in 1944, where he studied with Olivier Messiaen, among others. He won a number of prizes, including the prestigious Prix de Rome. This Concertino is a showpiece for brass instruments, with exquisite use of technique and luscious melodies.
